LAUDATO SI AND THE U.S. CATHOLIC CHURCH-On July 17, 2021, Catholic Climate Covenant and Creighton University hosted a conference on *Laudato Si and the U.S. Catholic Church*. Cardinal Blase Cupich of Chicago opened the conference by stating that “truly embracing” *Laudato Si* requires rejecting individualism and the false idol of economic growth that permits reckless exploitation of the environment. Cardinal Cupich spoke of three conversions: (1) thinking differently and engaging in ongoing dialogue about human beings, life, society and our relationship with nature, (2) becoming more aware of the interconnectedness of creation and the need for global solidarity through ecological education that is both informational and formational and (3) developing compassion and motivation in taking up the challenges we face. He said that he was convinced that it is useless to talk about advancing a culture of life, absent a vigorous commitment--both by individuals and communities--to making the sacrifices required for improving the socioeconomic, ecological and political crisis of our time. 3- SOUP KITCHEN

Soup Kitchen occurs each Sunday, for 52 Sundays. One of five individual teams of volunteers prepare hot meals for guests that come to Sacred Heart Church door for lunch 1:30 pm-2:30 pm. We serve 50-70 guests each week with wholesome, nutritious, hot meals. The meals are provided to the guests in compostable take-away containers at the door. An individual volunteer’s effort involves helping one Team on one Sunday a month to help prepare and package the meals. The cooking and preparation times are 9:30 am-1:00 pm on a Sunday. Mandatory COVID distancing and wearing of masks have been rescinded but some volunteers still wear masks.—Tom Horsch

Each team has a captain and a group of volunteers. Meals are planned, food purchased and cooked by each team, a total of 3-5 volunteers per team plus the captain for each Sunday of the month. Some food is donated by parishioners, USDA, and persons in the larger community. Some food cost is reimbursed by the parish. We serve **2,550-3,570 guests/meals annually**. **MOST NEEDED: LARGE PACKS OF PASTA**. Christopher Woods (757) 651-2372.

4- CATHOLIC WORKER-Steve Baggarly & Kim Williams

The Norfolk Catholic Worker continues making sandwiches at Sacred Heart on Mondays. and Wednesdays. The city is now putting up nearly 300 people (200 in hotel rooms and 100 at The Center on Brambleton and Granby). Even so, the



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number of people we've seen in August on our soupline has risen slightly. We've also been taking ice cold Gatorade to people on some days when the heat index has been 100 or above. If anyone would like to contribute **32 OZ. BOTTLES OF GATORADE**, we may see such hot days for several more weeks.

Our **Black Lives Matter** vigil continues from 4:15-5:15 pm on Thursdays at the corner of Hampton Blvd./27th St. Even when there are no new high profile police killings of unarmed African Americans, between nationwide efforts to make voting more laborious for Black communities and several states passing laws restricting how race can be taught in classrooms, it is unfortunately always timely to take a public stand for justice for our Black brothers and sisters. peace, Steve

ANNUAL REPORT—Sacred Heart Parish and the greater community supported SG School in this manner this year: salaries for 11 teachers (\$100 monthly), ½ head of school, and 1 nurse; lunch fees for 23 students (\$420 per child), 1 set of high school books, 21 full tuition scholarships (\$275 each), and some medical assistance. We are slowly decreasing our assistance to the operational costs at the school while investing in small projects that are **source of revenue and jobs for SG**: a water system for the Parish Community Center, a shop to sell clean drinking water, and a small stationery shop to sell school supplies. The goal is to help our twin parish to become increasingly self-sustaining, and eventually independent from outside aid, while praying together and continuing to grow in friendship.

4. THE CENTER-- A TEMPORARY SHELTER until October 1st. At least 5 parishioners from Sacred Heart are volunteering at the site. Together we continue supporting our vulnerable brothers and sisters. [The Center: Temporary Shelter — The Urban Renewal Center \(theurnorfolk.com\)](#) As we begin to move forward, we wanted to let you know that there are some specific opportunities at the shelter where we can and will most certainly need your help. The most direct needs coming up are as follows:

Assistance with Showers: every Monday, Thursday, and especially Saturday mornings (8:30-11:30am usually) and evenings (7-8/8:30pm usually). These individuals will assist in making sure all residents sign up, and that those who sign up and request will be able to receive the necessary resources for their shower. Along with this, you would be facilitating the keeping of time, so it functions smoothly. You will NEVER have to be in the shower to assist them in any way.



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Assistance with Front Desk Duties During Weekly Staff Meeting: Day and time TBD. These individuals will assist with check in and check out of residents and day guests, answering the phone and taking messages, and assisting guests with requests. It will most likely only be 1-1.5 hours. You're more than welcome to stay and continue to assist after, of course. :-)

Shower assistance can begin as soon as possible (we will be offering showers to guests tomorrow morning). 5. VIRGINIANS FOR ALTERNATIVES TO THE DEATH PENALTY (VADP)-Before joining VADP, I worked in Social Ministry at the Catholic Diocese of Richmond for 25 years.

At this point there is not much for us to report. VADP has been steadily reducing my hours since the end of the legislative session. Starting in September my role will be reduced further to an administrative function – keeping our database up to date, sending donation thank you letters, and bookkeeping. VADP has gone into semi-hibernation until the November election. Our board will then meet to assess the election results and decide whether to keep VADP alive to defend our victory at the General Assembly or to phase out of existence if our abolition victory seems politically secure.

Our only scheduled public meeting will be a death penalty abolition victory luncheon in Charlottesville on Sunday, November 21st. An email will go out within a week with details and a link to the web page where people can purchase tickets to attend.
